

Man shot on **busy street**

A MAN is in a stable condition after being shot in the leg on a busy road in Granville last week.

About 5.45pm last Thursday, the 21-year-old was approached by three males on Rawson Rd.

An argument then ensued and the victim was shot in his right thigh.

The man collapsed on the footpath before several members of the public rendered first aid.

The three men were seen heading west along Rawson Rd. The victim was taken to Westmead Hospital where he

remains in a stable condition. Police have spoken with several

witnesses but they have only provided general descriptions of the offenders.



WORLD-RENOWNED surgeon Prof Chris O'Brien returned to his old school, Parramatta Marist High, last week to share insights gained through his career and his continuing battle with cancer.

Prof O'Brien was a leading surgeon based at Prince Alfred Hospital and consulting surgeon on Channel Nine's hit medical program RPA until he retired in 2006 after he was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumour.

His visit and speech to the school was all the more inspiring considering his ill health.

Prof O'Brien told the boys how he grew up in Regents Park, Bankstown and then Westmead.

The founder of the Australian and New Zealand Head and Neck Society said his schooling years were the ones that had shaped him.

"The many years at Parramatta were really the years that made me who I am," Prof O'Brien said.

"Discipline was absolute.

"But (Marist) instilled an enormous sense of unity and school spirit."

He had a lot of advice for the students but said the most valuable thing he had learnt was the importance of compassion.

"True men, with steel in their backbone, have compassion," he said.

"Don't wait until you've got a brain tumour to open your hearts.

During student question time, Prof O'Brien was prompted to give updates about his state of health and future plans.

"After two months of being

cancer-free there's a regrowth of

the cancer in my brain and I have to confront a fourth operation on Monday (June 9)," he said. "I will not be returning to work.


I've had a terrific career but in November 2006 I had to stop everything in my life.

"The cancer has been a gift – some people might think 'some gift' – but it has given me an opportunity to re-evaluate my life and reinvent myself.

"I have set two goals: to write a book and have a world-class cancer centre built. The illness has created the opportunity to see these goals through."
